


Ready or not... Here I come

"Redlam"


Having a sister means sharing things you don't want to share and fighting over... well, everything.

Two and a half years later, we had our second daughter, Lyndsay and 22 months after that, our third, Haylee. At the time, my only experience with a professional photography studio was Wal-Mart. While I wish I had more creative, striking images of my daughters, I am thankful for the memories and portraits I do have, created by their studio. It wasn't until a friend from church, J.C. Little, who was a photographer, offered to do portraits of my children that I realized there were other options out there. He did a wonderful job, and I it was at that moment that I decided I wanted to be able to create beautiful images of my children myself. I had started doing scrapbooks for my children, documenting their growth and beauty. With a \$20 camera as the source of creating these "works of Art," I am sure you can imagine that my images were lacking in the area of technical excellence. So, the search for the perfect camera was on. I chose to purchase a 35 mm Minolta. It was the camera I had dreamed of, or so I thought. With no schooling or training in the field of photography, I stepped out on faith and purchased the proper equipment to start my business. My Mamiya 645 AF was my first professional camera, and I was in love. I am grateful that I had the opportunity to learn film before heading into the wonderful world of digital.





In 2013, I received my Photographic Craftsman degree. It was a great accomplishment for me, considering I never thought I would be a public speaker. Talking in front of people terrified me. I realized that when it is something you are passionate about, it comes easy. Six months after receiving my Craftsman, I was accepted as a PPA approved Affiliate Juror. Judging competitions has been such a huge inspiration, and it has made me a better photographer. I love every part of it. In 2016, I walked the stage and received my Master Artist degree along with Imaging Excellence. It has forced me to use my imagination and creativity more, and I have truly enjoyed this journey. Every step I have taken to work towards another PPA degree has resulted in a tremendous growth in the quality of my work. Therefore, I see it as a challenge and a benefit to continue in education.
